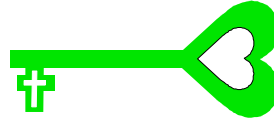
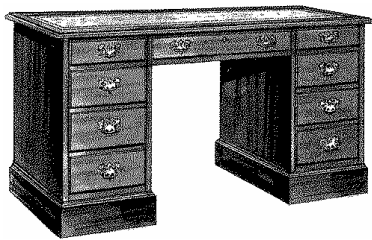

From the Pastor's Desk

Way to Go Church!



This month's message is me telling you "way to go!" I have 4 examples of us, as a church, being a loving, caring, growing, friendly church, and I just wanted to share them with you. I hope that through these examples

you'll be able to step back and see our church from a wider perspective, and feel good about who we are as Christ's body and example to our community and the world.

The first example was from our Church Officer Retreat. Our Executive Presbyter Bill Saum was our opening speaker on Friday night a few weeks ago, and he pointed out how unique we are. He cited the fact that mainline denominations have declined by 50% since 1970, including the Presbyterians, the U. Methodists, the Lutherans, etc. And yet, over the last 8 years our church has grown by 50%. In 1997 we had 210 members, and in 2005 we had 313 members, nearly a 50% gain in that time. He praised us for whatever it is we are doing that is so infectious to others to want to be a part of the church family here.


The second example occurred about a year ago. A nearby Presbyterian church has received a rather hefty (can you say "millions"?) bequest, and they are struggling with priorities on how to spend it. But in the midst of such a generous donation, one of their elders asked a member from our church, "Although we have millions to spend, we see your church active and growing, and wish we had your spirit. What are you doing up in Branchville?" My conclusion is that money is not the key ingredient for being an effective church.

The next example happened just a few weeks ago in and after our worship service. A young child wanted to sing with the Cherubs up front, but didn't get up there quickly enough. When the others began to sing before she got there, she became shy and headed back to her parents, but was sad that she wasn't singing, so started to cry. This unhappiness caused her younger sister to cry also, and as the Cherubs sang, "Jesus Loves the Little Children," another new (older) couple sitting nearby turned and told the crying children's mother, "Maybe you should just take those kids out of here." This upset the mother, who took her two crying children out of worship. I heard about this incident after the service was over, and was rather annoyed that someone, who was *not* a member of our church, would upset a mother like that and give us a bad reputation. I needn't have worried. A member set the older couple straight about this church being family-friendly, an usher spoke to the mother, and 3 or 4 others sought out the young family during Coffee Hour and assured them that their children are welcomed and wanted in worship, and that children being children is not frowned upon in our church. By the time I was able to catch up with the mom and dad, they felt much better, and had been greatly reassured that our church was welcoming to children, just as the song said.

And finally, I met with a small class of new member hopefuls, who shared how they came to our church. All of them said that the first time they came to our church they felt welcomed into a warm and comfortable atmosphere. Some of them had shopped at many churches in Sussex County, where often not a soul spoke to them, but at Branchville they were greeted, talked to, not overwhelmed, but made to feel at home, and they said they *knew* on that first visit that this was the church for them.

So again I say, "way to go church!" We have somehow found a way to be warm and caring without being overpowering and insincere. Over the years we are reaching out to others and welcoming them into our fellowship, and slowly swimming against the tide of church membership decline. This isn't cause to stop and pat ourselves on the back that we are done, but I wanted to just show a few ways we have been faithful to Christ's example of reaching out to others in love and caring. Paul says in Romans 5:2 (living bible) "*For because of our faith, he has brought us into this place of highest privilege where we now stand, and we confidently and joyfully look forward to actually becoming all that God has had in mind for us to be.*" It is a privilege to worship and serve God, so let us look forward confidently and joyfully to the process of continuing to grow into Christ's likeness. Keep up the good work, and I'll see you in church.

REPORT FROM YOUR SANCTUARY TASK FORCE

This is the first of a series of regular communications you will receive from us. The purpose is to keep you informed of our progress, and to solicit your input.

On October 16th the Sanctuary Task Force met with Mr. Michael Campbell, the architect we hired to help us answer the many questions we have, and to assist us in determining the feasibility of different options for our sanctuary. This is the first of many meetings that we will have with him.

He wants to know our priorities and your ideas, so to begin that process here will be a suggestion box in the rear of the sanctuary for you to tell us about any ideas, suggestions or dreams you have for our worship space. Please place your suggestions in this box during the month of November. Also, feel free to speak directly to any of us.

Michael is going to conduct a comprehensive inspection of our current structure, take measurements, and draw up floor plans. At our next meeting (in 4-6 weeks) Michael will provide us with those drawings. Throughout the process, he will be asking us questions so that together we can start to solidify a few possible courses of action.

We have identified several questions that we will have to answer in order to direct the process effectively. Some of these questions are: What capacity do we want in our choir area? What capacity do we want in our sanctuary, and of that, how much do we want in the balcony? What codes need to be met and which might we get a "pass" on?

We will also have an open meeting to hear your input for possible modifications and improvements to our sanctuary on Monday, November 27th at 7:00 pm. Your input will have a direct influence on the future of our sanctuary so if you'd like to be heard outloud rather than just via a suggestion box, please come out on that evening.

Of course you may contact us with any questions and feedback you may have at any time – but however you do it, via suggestion box, at the meeting or directly to any one of us, we'd like to hear from you.

LONG RANGE PLANNING RETREAT RESULTS

To: Our Church Ministers

Yes, this article is to you! Did you know you are the ministers of this church? “The ministry is the membership of the church, not a special group set apart from the rest.” That’s one of the many things we learned during our recent Elder and Deacon retreat. Throughout the retreat, we studied our roles and responsibilities as Elders and Deacons, watched our pastor crawl around on his hands and knees in a game of charades, kept John Newcomer out past his curfew, worshiped together, ate together, and got better acquainted. God was with us, and it was a wonderful weekend!

We also completed the first step of a four step planning process. The four steps are: 1- Determine where we are today. 2 - Determine where God wants us to be in the future. 3 - Develop a plan to get us from here to there. And 4 - Analyze what is working and not working, feed this information back into the process, and return to step 1.

This is a very exciting time for our church. For the past 8 years our attendance has grown steadily. What’s amazing is that this growth has occurred during a time when the large majority of churches (all denominations) have seen their attendance decline significantly. What makes us different? Some of our strengths were identified as, making new visitors feel welcome, a large and active volunteer force, great programs (youth group, music, worship, friendship circle, etc.), and a family-friendly atmosphere. Our average weekly attendance places us on the fringe between being a pastoral-sized church and a program-sized church. Without getting bogged down in details, what this means is that for our attendance to continue to grow, we will need more programming to meet more needs. This is one of the many issues the session will be examining as we move to the second step of the planning process.

In addition to assessing our health, as measured in numbers, we also assessed the spiritual state of our church. We did so by comparing how well our church family exhibits different “natures of mature faith.” We concluded that our church is spiritually mature in the following areas:

- Serves humanity, consistently and passionately, through acts of love and justice.

- Holds life-affirming values, including commitments to racial and general equality, affirmation of cultural and religious diversity, and personal sense of responsibility for the welfare of others.
- Trusts in God’s saving grace and well-being, security, and peace.

We also identified two areas where we are not as strong. They are:

- Seeks spiritual growth through study, reflection, prayer, and discussion with others.
- Advocates social and global change to bring about greater social justice.

Finally, we conducted an assessment of our church mission statement. What we discovered is that we do not currently have an approved mission statement. We made some adjustments to an existing draft mission statement, and hope to have an approved version for you soon.

Again, you are the ministers of God’s church, and as such, we more than value your feedback, we need it! God uses each and every one of us. So please, if you have ideas for the future, see strengths on which we can capitalize, or areas where we need to improve, let one of your church officers or PJ (Pastor Jeff) know so that we can incorporate it into the second step of our planning process.

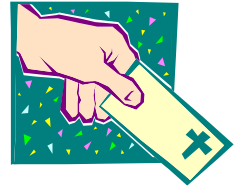

BUS TRIP TO CARNEGIE HALL:

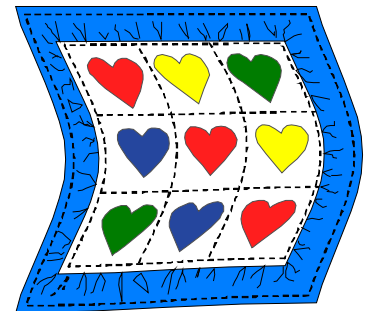

OUR MISSION OUTREACH

Where can a pregnant woman or a mother with an infant in the early stages of recovery from substance abuse go? There is a home in Franklin called Sunrise House that has been helping such women for seventeen years. The House can accommodate 12 women and their babies with each having their own bedroom. Cooking and cleaning are shared responsibilities just as they would be in a family home.

The women remain in the program for a year. The focus is on recovery, parenting, education and life skills such as budgeting, menu planning, and cooking. They are encouraged to complete a GED if they do not have a high school diploma or to take college courses at the County College if they have graduated from high school. They are also given computer training to provide them with a marketable skill.

Sunrise House for Women and Children is the mission outreach for this quarter. Contributions may be put in the envelopes in the pews, clearly marked for Missions. Also, please mark your check for Missions on the memo line. Thank you for caring.

HANDBELL HAPPENINGS

Handbell Questions and Answers:

Q: Who owns our handbells?

A: The First Presbyterian Church of Branchville owns our handbells, along with all the handbell supplies and equipment we use.

Q: Where did our handbells come from?

A: Actually, we don't know. We've heard that our handbells came from another church which no longer needed them. The other church might have been closing its doors, or maybe it just didn't have enough people to make a handbell choir. Some versions of the story say that the bells were a gift to us from this other church; other versions say that we purchased the bells. In any case, this all happened before any of our current ringers got involved with the bell choir, so none of us have the story first hand. If anyone knows, we'd love to hear from you!



We ourselves have added a couple of new small bells to our collection, and purchased needed equipment and supplies over the past few years. (The Handbell Quartet's performance at Carnegie Hall in 2004 helped fund these purchases.) But the origin of our core 3-octave set of handbells remains a mystery.

ROCK GROUP GIVES \$75,000 TO PC(USA) FOR KATRINA-RELIEF, MONEY WILL BE USED TO BUY MATERIAL FOR REBUILDING

The Hurricane Katrina relief effort of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) received a big boost Tuesday (Aug. 8) thanks to a \$75,000 contribution rock ‘n’ roll style.

The announcement came during an afternoon news conference where representatives of the rock band *3 Doors Down* presented Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) with the money, which will go for purchasing construction materials to rebuild homes along the Gulf Coast. The news conference was held at a volunteer village in Gautier, Mississippi, one of six such sites in Mississippi and Louisiana operated by the relief and recovery program of the PC(USA). Each village houses work teams from churches across the country helping with the response.

Band spokesman Mark Smith said *3 Doors Down* was impressed with the effectiveness and efficiency of PDA's Gautier village, which is located in southeast Mississippi near the Alabama border, about 20 miles east of Biloxi, MS. He said the contribution was made through The Better Life Foundation, the band's charitable agency named after its first CD.

"Initially we did immediate relief stuff and right now the most important thing on the Gulf Coast is rebuilding," Smith told the *Presbyterian News Service*. "So we want this distribution to help with rebuilding efforts and to help people step-by-step get closer to where they were before the storm hit."

The band, whose members are from nearby Escatawpa, MS, were an early supporter of disaster-relief efforts following last fall's Gulf Coast hurricanes and continues to raise money for the cause through sales of its music and special concert appearances.

"For me the gift from *3 Doors Down* affirms the visible presence that Presbyterians have along the Gulf and for local people they are becoming the responder of choice," said Susan Ryan, PDA's coordinator. "If local people are saying that this is a place they want to put their money, then it validates the kind of wonderful work and ministry that is happening in the Gulf."

Ryan said the money would purchase a range of building-related materials such as drywall, shingles, doors, and windows. The funds are earmarked for use only by volunteers working out of the Gautier volunteer village, Smith said.

The widespread destruction left by Katrina and other hurricanes last year led to the PC(USA)'s biggest-ever domestic relief effort. The band's \$75,000 adds to a record-setting \$23 million in contributions raised by PDA in response to Hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Wilma.

"They were out on tour when Hurricane Katrina hit," Smith said of the band. "When they came back home and saw it, it was just complete shock. In some places it looked like Iraq."

3 Doors Down has sold more than 12 million records in the United States alone since debuting in 2000 with their CD "The Better Life." The band's follow up release in 2002, "Away From The Sun," remained on the Billboard Top 200 Chart for almost two years.

3 Doors Down has written six number one hit singles including (according to Nielsen) the most played song in the country in 2003 "When I'm Gone" and the 2004 critically acclaimed ballad "Here Without You."

One of the band's guitar players, Chris Henderson, who was present at the news conference, lives near PDA's volunteer village in Gautier, which is pronounced "go-shay." His home took on six feet of water from Katrina and every member of the group had at least one family member directly impacted by the storm, Smith said. Joining Henderson in *3 Doors Down* is Brad Arnold, lead vocals; Matt Roberts, guitar; and Todd Harrell, bass.

It's great because they're local boys and they want to make a contribution to the redevelopment of their community," said Camille Lopez, PDA's volunteer village coordinator. "They really wanted to make sure that they put it into somebody's hands that would take good care of the money and made sure it was spent properly on people who needed it."

RECIPE OF THE MONTH



Beefy Biscuit Pot Pie

This simple recipe uses convenience foods like canned cream of mushroom soup, frozen corn, and refrigerated biscuit dough for a hearty dinner.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 lb. ground beef or 12 oz. meatless frozen crumbles
- 1 onion, chopped
- 10 oz. can cream of mushroom soup with roasted garlic
- 9 oz. pkg. frozen corn

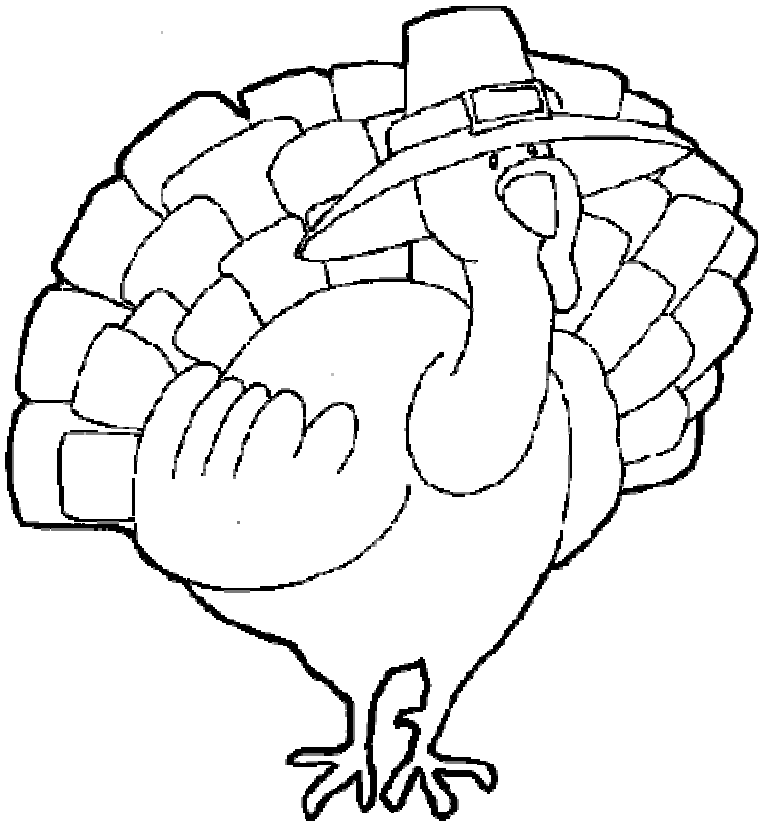
- 1 cup chopped tomatoes, seeded
- 1/2 tsp. dried basil leaves
- 1 can refrigerated biscuit dough
- 2 Tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 tsp. dried oregano leaves

PREPARATION:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In large skillet, cook ground beef and onion until beef is no longer pink; drain. (If using crumbles, cook onion in 1 Tbsp. olive oil until tender; add crumbles and heat until thawed.) Add soup, corn, tomatoes, and basil; bring to a boil.

Pour beef mixture into 1-1/2 quart baking dish. Top with biscuits and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and oregano. Bake at 400 degrees F for 15-18 minutes until biscuits are deep golden brown. 4 servings
